accordance with the Community Strategic Plan – Strathfield 2030. Our community plan is based on a rigorous and widespread community engagement process and provides strategies for the next ten years and beyond and directions for actions to address the changes and challenges in our community and urban environment.

Delivering new, renewed and well maintained community infrastructure and delivering programs has remained a Council priority throughout this Council term and in 2020-2021, many projects were completed. The upgraded Strathfield Library opened on 1 July 2021 including a new exhibition gallery and innovation hub. After significant consultation and planning, the Homebush Town Centre was implemented. The transformation of Hudson Park into a vibrant district park was acknowledged as winner of the 2020 Greater Sydney Planning Awards 'Great Place to Live and/or Work' category.

On an annual basis, an independent survey of community perceptions of Council's performance is undertaken. Results from the 2021 survey indicate high levels of community satisfaction of Council's performance, services, programs and infrastructure.

The COVID-19 pandemic continued to impact on Council operations over two successive financial years since it commenced in early 2020. Council implemented a wide range of public health measures to curtail the spread of COVID-19. This included extensive communication and notification campaigns and shifting changes to delivery of local services and programs to ameliorate the impacts of public health orders on the local community. Towards the end of this financial year, Greater Sydney was placed into lockdown due to increasing numbers of COVID-19 infections and spread of the Delta variant.

While the financial statements for 2020-2021 indicate some impact of COVID-19 on Council's financial performance, the financial outlook of Strathfield Council is stable and remains sustainable in the medium to long-term. Council met the majority of the State Government's benchmarks that indicate long-term financial sustainability.

Our Annual Report demonstrates that Strathfield Council has continued to achieve sustainable and good results for its community across a wide range of services and functions.

About Strathfield Council

The Local Government Area (LGA) of Strathfield has a total area of approximately 13.9 square kilometres. Strathfield Council is located in Sydney's Inner West about 10.5 kilometres from the city centre and half way between Parramatta and the city. Homebush Bay Drive bounds the Local Government Area to the north, Powells Creek, The Boulevarde and Coronation Parade to the east, Punchbowl Road and Juno Parade in the south and Roberts Road, Chullora rail yards, Rookwood Cemetery and the Sydney Olympic Park rail line to the west.

Strathfield Council includes the suburbs of Strathfield (postcode 2135), Strathfield South (2136), Homebush (2140), Homebush West (2140), part of Belfield (2191) and part of Greenacre (2190). Sydney Markets is also located within the Strathfield Local Government Area and has its own postcode, 2129.

Strathfield is predominantly residential but has significant commercial and industrials areas. The major commercial centre is the Strathfield Town Centre adjacent to Strathfield Station, with commercial areas also located at Homebush, Homebush West, Sydney Markets, Strathfield South and Cave Road. Strathfield Station, one of the largest and busiest railway stations in NSW, lies in the heart of the Local Government Area and services an average of 10,000 commuters per day. There are also rail stations at Homebush and Flemington.

The traditional owners of the area are the Wangal clan of the Darug Aboriginal people. The first European land grants to free settlers commenced in 1793 in the District of Liberty Plains, partly located within the current Strathfield LGA. Residential growth commenced in the late 1800s and early 1900s promoted by access to rail transports at Homebush, Strathfield and Flemington.

Significant population growth occurred after WWI and with the addition of the former Homebush Council in 1947 and part of Enfield Council in 1949, the population stabilised around 27,000 to 29,000 until the 2000s, when population increased due to redevelopment of land for multi-unit dwellings particularly in town centres and transport hubs. The current estimated residential population of Strathfield Council (as at June 2020) is estimated at about 47,767.

Strathfield Council

Strathfield Council was incorporated on 2 June 1885, which included the suburbs of Redmyre (renamed Strathfield), Homebush and Druitt Town (renamed Strathfield South). The unincorporated area of Flemington (now Homebush West) was added to the Strathfield Council area on 19 February 1892. From 1892, the Council area was divided into three wards: Strathfield, Flemington and Homebush Wards. In 1916, wards were abolished and all Aldermen were elected by those eligible to vote.

On 19 August 1930, parts of Homebush West were transferred from the Lidcombe Municipality to Strathfield Council. The former Municipality of Homebush was added to Strathfield Council on 25 May 1947. The west ward of the former Municipality of Enfield was added to Strathfield Council on 1 January 1949.

There have been two minor boundary adjustments. In 1953, Strathfield Council's south western boundary at Roberts Road Greenacre was altered when the site of the former Bankstown Sanitary Depot came under Bankstown Council control. In 1992, the western boundary of the Strathfield Municipality was adjusted involving land exchanges between Strathfield and Auburn Councils.

The term 'Alderman' was changed to 'Councillor' and 'Town Clerk' was changed to 'General Manager' or Chief Executive Officer (CEO) with the implementation of the *Local Government Act 1993*.

Strathfield Council is incorporated under the *Local Government Act 1993* and is comprised of seven councillors, who are elected by the residents and ratepayers of Strathfield Local Government Area. The role of the Councillors is to direct and control the affairs of the Council in accordance with the *Local Government Act* and other applicable legislation.

NSW local government elections are usually held every four years. Due to COVID-19 measures, the date of the next Council election was deferred from September 2020 to September 2021 but was further deferred to 4 December 2021 as a consequence of lockdowns in Greater Sydney from late June 2021. At the last council election on 9 September 2017, the following councillors were elected:




Mayor and Deputy Mayor



Capital Works Program 2020-2021

Council spent a total of \$7.929 million on infrastructure and land improvements in 2020-2021.

The focus of the infrastructure expenditure was to:

- Upgrade or replace community facilities to meet the needs of the Strathfield community
- To meet current and future needs of a growing and diverse population
- To prioritise renewal or replacement of infrastructure with less than satisfactory condition ratings and decrease Council's infrastructure backlog

Works undertaken under Council's infrastructure and capital works programs include:



To meet the needs of a growing and diverse population, Council has progressively been upgrading its community assets by providing new or upgraded facilities. In the 2020-2021 year, the following key projects included:

- Stage one of the transformation of Hudson Park at Strathfield from a golf course into a district park was completed. This stage included the construction of a new lake, significant tree planting and development of open space for active and passive recreation. The new Maze was also completed. The new Pavilion and Café was substantially commenced but due to COVID measures delays deferred completion of the project until 2021-2022. Plans were prepared for Hudson Park stage 2 works including courts and playgrounds.
- Crane Street Park was opened by the Mayor in August 2020 featuring open space, sandstone plinth seating, solar lighting and multi-use grass and hard surface areas.
- Sportsfield lighting was installed at Bark Huts Reserve, Cooke Park and Strathfield Park.
 An outdoor fitness centre was installed at Airey Park. A new cricket practice wicket was built at Freshwater Park.
- The new Strathfield Park pavilion was completed which included toilets, change rooms and kiosk. Development of a new amenities pavilion including a café in Strathfield Park was commenced with projected completion in 2021-2022.
- The community hall in Melville Reserve Homebush was completed and opened in 2021.
- New bus shelters were installed at bus stops throughout the Strathfield LGA, which conform with current disability standards.







Roads, footpaths, drainage, kerbs & gutters

A total of \$4.396 million was expended to roads, footpaths, drainage, kerbs and gutter renew and improvements across all of the Council area.

Due to the impact of COVID-19, works which were programmed did not proceed and have been transferred to works programs in 2021-2022. Works that were completed in 2020-2021 are listed below.

Works occurred over 2020-2021 to upgrade the Homebush shopping centre, which included improvements to the appearance of the shopping precinct at Rochester St and Burlington Roads featuring new paving, planter beds, street trees, bins and benches. Burlington Road was converted to one-way with ample 45 degree parking on the northern side to improve traffic flow and increase parking spots.







COVID-19 Impacts

The COVID-19 pandemic continued to be a major disruptor to the Australia's society and economy in 2020-2021. From the declaration of the COVID-19 pandemic in January 2020, measures to restrict transmission and spread of the disease have affected Council's service and program delivery over two successive financial years.

In July 2020, a testing clinic was established in Bressington Park which in January 2021 moved to nearby Sydney Olympic Park. Towards the end of this financial year in June 2021, Greater Sydney experienced an infection surge and transmission of 'Delta' a more virulent and infectious variant of COVID-19, which resulted in sweeping lockdowns across metropolitan Councils including Strathfield LGA.

Council has continually supported actions to improve access to COVID testing and to promote and achieve high rates of vaccination in the Strathfield LGA. The next Council election, which had been delayed by a year was further delayed until 4 December 2021, due to a surge in COVID infections in Sydney and Greater Sydney lockdown from late June 2021, the election has been rescheduled to 4 December 2021.

Council has implemented measures consistent with public health orders to restrict transmission and spread of the disease as well as providing support and information for affected communities. Council's comprehensive COVID-19 safety plan was regularly reviewed and updated to address the challenges and changes to public health orders. In adapting and responding to the challenges of COVID-19, delivery of certain activities involved more complex management and higher operational costs, while some services, events and facilities were unable to continue until the COVID-19 measures were relaxed.

Where possible Council minimised impacts and maintained high levels of services to the community. Council's communications informed and promoted public safety and health awareness including signage in multi-language formats throughout the Council area. Where possible, community programs were transitioned into online delivery such as Singalong sessions and Virtual Christmas Carols in 2020. Essential services such as waste collection and food inspection continued without interruption and implemented new safety processes, especially in interactions with the public. Council's inspectors assessed local food businesses COVID-19 safety plans and compliance and took action where premises were without plans or non-complying.

Programs were established to assist local businesses and vulnerable and isolated members of the local community through Neighbour to Neighbour programs. In 2021, the Helping Hand Strathfield program was established to lend a hand by linking individuals with identified needs to appropriate health and social support services, covering topics such as health care, vaccinations, mental health, managing finances, housing, domestic violence and more, especially from culturally and linguistically diverse communities. Information was distributed in 7 different languages.



2020-2021 Highlights

New community and recreational facilities

Sportsfield lighting at Strathfield Park and the new park Pavilion was completed which included a kiosk, toilets and change rooms. The Bark Huts Reserve and Cooke Park sportsfield lighting was upgraded. Outdoor fitness equipment was installed at Ford Park, Freshwater Park, Dean Reserve and Airey Park. Lighting upgrades and installation of informal pathway was completed at Airey Park around Alan Davidson Oval. The new Crane Street park was opened in August 2020. Works commenced on new amenities buildings at Hudson Park and Strathfield Park scheduled for completion in 2021-2022.

Hudson Park transformation

The transformation of Hudson Park, Strathfield's largest park, from a golf course into a district park has progressed over the last two years. Stage 1 works were completed that including a new lake, significant landscaping and creation of open spaces. In 2020-2021, the Maze was completed and work on a Pavilion and Café commenced. Plans were developed for the next stage of works which includes playgrounds and courts.

Library and Innovation Hub

The upgraded Strathfield Library and Innovation Hub was opened on 1 July 2020. The hub featured more comfortable and engaging spaces that enhance learning and information sharing with new exhibition areas. A number of exhibitions were held in the new Ironbark Gallery including the locally developed 'Strathfield Answers the Call – World War I', an exhibition about the impact of WWI on the local Strathfield community was exhibited from April to June 2021.

Technology was upgraded to include laptops, Mac computers, software and a 3-D printer. Solar panels were installed to improve the building's energy efficiency. Council's innovative digital library locker service was expanded with additional lockers. This services enables patrons to order online, collect and return library materials at any time day or night in various locations in the Strathfield Council area. Plans were adopted to add outdoor areas to the building's ground floor in 2021-2022.

Town Centre upgrades

Upgrade of the Homebush Town Centre was completed to improve the appearance of the shopping precinct and improve traffic flow and access to parking. Rochester Street and Burlington Road pavements were upgraded, planter beds, bins and benches.

Burlington Road was converted to one-way with ample 45 degree parking on the eastern side to improve traffic flow and parking, roundabouts installed at intersections at Rochester Street/Burlington Road and Rochester Street/The Crescent.

Local Planning Strategic Plan and Local Environmental Plan

In 2020, Council adopted its new Local Strategic Planning Statement (LSPS), a 20 year land use planning strategy which defines Council's long term vision for land use and infrastructure provision. The LSPS provides strategic focus for the review of the Local Environmental Plan (LEP).

Biodiversity and Greening Strathfield

2,500 new tree plantings were added to Hudson Park and Cooks River corridor. Nearly 500 new street trees were planted to replace missing or diseased trees and improve the tree canopy across the Council area. Tree plantings included varying species and ages which assist in reducing air pollution and urban heat effects while improving the appearance of local parks and residential streetscapes.

13 Plans of Management were adopted in 2020 for community land owned or managed by Council. The plans of management set out processes and actions for the management of the various community land uses including parks, sportsground and natural areas located within the parks and reserves in the Strathfield LGA.

Council launched an innovative project in partnership with Macquarie University to trial plantings of trees in industrial areas in Greenacre. A bird study and new operational plans, were prepared to improve the management of Strathfield's Mason Park Wetlands.

Improved public health

Council extended smoking bans in the Strathfield CBD to include the shops on The Boulevarde to Margaret Street as well as Homebush and Homebush West Town Centres. Education campaigns were conducted before commencing issuing of fines for non-compliance. While the smoke free centres promote better health outcomes, the centres have benefited also from improved amenity and reduced waste litter waste.


Targets to achieve high standards of food safety were met in 2020-2021 with 80% of all local food businesses including mobile vans, school canteens and childcare centres, receiving 'Scores on Doors' certificates. Certificates are issued to those high and medium risk food businesses meeting requirements after inspections of their businesses.

Council Service Performance


The Strathfield Community Strategic Plan sets out performance measures that enable Council to monitor its progress in achieving community desired outcomes. Measures relate to community issue statements that express the expectations of the Strathfield community and align with Council's Quadruple Bottom Line (QBL) of civic leadership, economic, environmental and social. Council's commissions an annual performance survey, which is conducted by an independent research company and aligns with the key demographic profile of the most recent Census.

The 2021 results show that the community considers that Strathfield Council is performing at a high standard with 68% rating the overall Council performance as excellent or good. The research showed that there are high levels of resident satisfaction with the majority of Council's facilities and infrastructure, community programs, services and community safety.

Overall Council Performance




Facilities and Infrasture 2021

Community Programs and Service 2021




Organisational Structure

The CEO is responsible for the operation of the Council's organisation and for implementing decisions of the Council. The CEO is also responsible for the day to day management of the Council, the exercise of any functions delegated to him by the Council, the appointment of staff, the direction and dismissal of staff and the implementation of Council's Equal Employment Opportunity Management Plan.

Following the 2017 Council election, the organisational structure was reviewed and a new structure has been adopted.

To assist the CEO in the exercise of their functions, there are four departments of Council. These departments are headed by the Director Infrastructure & Development (Deputy GM), Director People, Place and Civic Services, Director Corporate and Financial Services and Director of the Office of the CEO. Each of the departments is divided into a number of sections, which are run by a Manager.

Funding for managing and controlling companion animals

All pound data returns and data concerning dog attacks were lodged with the Office of Local Government in accordance with the Guidelines on the Exercise of Function under the Companion Animals Act. A total of \$13,431 was expended on Council's companion animal management programs and activities.

Strategies for alternatives to euthanasia for unclaimed animals

Strathfield Council's pound is funded by Council and operated through the Enfield Veterinary Hospital, which supports a rehousing strategy for stray and lost animals as an alternative to euthanasia. No dogs were rehomed in 2020-2021. In 2020-2021, 16 cats and 19 dogs were pounded by Council. A total of 13 were returned to their owners including 1 cat and 12 dogs.

Dog attacks

Information lodged as part of Council's Companion Animal Register is supplied yearly to the Office of Local Government. There was 11 reported dog attacks in 2020-2021.

Community Education programs

Council supports education about responsibilities for companion animals through information on microchipping and registration available at Council's Customer Service and website. Information on responsibilities for companion animals was translated into frequently used community languages: Korean and Chinese. This information is available on Council's website and Customer Service Centre.

Off-Leash areas

Council provides three off-leash areas for dogs at Elliott Reserve Belfield, Ismay Reserve (Allen Street) Homebush and Bressington Park Homebush. Ismay Reserve and Bressington Park off-leash areas are fully gated and Elliott Reserve is gated at Elliott Street and Punchbowl Road.

Equal Employment Opportunity and Diversity 2020-2021

Council's Equal Opportunity Management Plan is a requirement under section 344 of the *Local Government Act* and is included in Council's Workforce Management Plan, which is published in the Community Strategic Plan on an annual basis.

In 2020-2021, gender balance improved across Council, while the staff CALD profile is increasingly more representative of the community we serve through recruitment and selection activities during the year. There were no instances of discrimination and/or harassment reported to HR and no instances of any member of staff feeling offended, humiliated or intimidated by anyone (staff/community) in their time at work. The major initiative this year has been the harmonisation of terms and conditions of work of all staff which is a welcome EEO initiative by all stakeholders. All staff now work a 35 hour a week regime which includes compressed working hours offering a four (4) day work week. In the stressful times of 2020/21 this arrangement has allowed staff to spend more time away from work being shared with family, friends, hobbies, fitness/health endeavours etc. to help counter the adverse impacts of Covid-19 anxiety and lockdown. EAP, two (2) days Health and Wellbeing days (from sick leave entitlements), paid access to testing and vaccination and a supportive management team have helped display and prove Council's commitment to health and wellbeing. Council's training plan has suffered severe adverse impacts with a large proportion of training having to be cancelled at short notice due to logistical issues, trainer issues, staff absences and training not being able to be conducted on-line, however all mandatory training including EEO, Code of Conduct, Work Health & Safety, ICAC etc. was completed. Challenges existed throughout the year and continue but the goodwill and commitment of management and staff to EEO has enabled Council to weather these challenges and appears to be able to do so in the coming year.

Stormwater Charge

(Local Government Regulation clause 217 (1) (e))

The Stormwater Management Service Charge is made in accordance with the Local Government Amendment (Stormwater) Act 2005 and amendments to the Local Government (General) Regulation 2005. A "stormwater management service" is defined as a service to manage the quantity or quality, or both, of stormwater that flows off land, and includes a service to manage the re-use of stormwater for any purpose. Council has established a Stormwater Management Service Charge and in 2020-2021 levied the charge at:

- \$25.00 for land categorised as residential
- \$12.50 per residential strata lot, including residential flats, community title, tenants-in-common residential units.
- \$25 for land categorised as business, plus an additional \$25 for each 350 square metres or part of 350 square metres by which the area of the parcel of land exceeds 350 square metres.
- \$12.50 for business strata lots.
- No charge for persons eligible for pensioner rate rebates.

Annual income from the Stormwater Management Charge in 2020-2021 totalled \$314,131 with the amount of \$555,000 carried over from the previous period as works were deferred from previous years.

A total of \$139,000 was expended on capital works, repair and maintenance. The primary works completed include The Boulevarde Drainage works

Work on Private Land

Integrated Planning and Reporting Framework

The Community Strategic Plan – Strathfield 2030 was adopted in 2018 following the 2017 Council election and review of strategies and directions for the Strathfield community for the next ten years and beyond. The review was supported by a rigorous and widespread community engagement process which identified key community priorities including managing traffic and parking, supporting well connected transport networks, managing the needs of a growing population, maintaining and improving green spaces throughout Strathfield including parks, open space and streetscapes, maintaining high quality built environment and streetscapes, developing new recreational facilities, maintaining urban character and promoting vibrant village centres, safe communities, and affordable housing. The plan is based on the five broad inter-related themes of Connectivity, Community Wellbeing, Civic Pride and Place Management, Liveable Neighbourhoods and Responsible Leadership.

The process and strategic and operational plans are set out below.

Delivery Program, Operational Plan and Resourcing Strategy

The Community Strategic Plan is supported by the Council's Delivery Program (4 year plan) and Operational Plan (annual) which include a series of targets under each of the goals and strategies to measure the delivery of the plan.

The Resourcing Strategy supports the implementation of the Community Strategic Plan, Delivery Program and Operational Plans. It consists of three components long-term financial plan, asset management plan and workforce management plan.

Measuring and Reporting

The Delivery Program and annual Operational Plan are monitored through half yearly, annual and End of Term reports and quarterly and annual financial reports to Council.

End of Term Report

The End of Term Report for the Council term 2017-2021 was presented to the final Council meeting on 2 November 2021 before the December 2021 Council election. The report is published as an attachment to this Annual Report.





Highlights 2020-21

Growth Sustained by Well-planned and Accessible Infrastructure

To meet the needs of a growing and increasingly diverse population, Council has focused on upgrading or providing new community infrastructure, which was identified as a key community priority in the Community Strategic Plan. In the last few years, the Council has delivered new or upgraded parks and sportsgrounds across all suburbs in the Strathfield Council area. In this financial year, new and upgraded parks and recreation facilities were delivered at Hudson Park, Strathfield Park, Freshwater Park and Airey Park.

Connected and Integrated Transport Networks

Council spent \$4.396 million on renewal and upgrades of roads, footpath and drainage infrastructure across the Strathfield Council area. Repairs and renewal work was prioritised based on the condition of asset assessments. In 2020-2021, Council met the State Government financial benchmarks relating to asset maintenance, renewal ratios and infrastructure backlogs.

The Strathfield Connector Bus is a community bus service that runs across the LGA providing transport connections and assists in reducing traffic congestion and vehicle use. Council operates two routes which service the north and south of the LGA and a tracker of the position of the bus in 'live-time' is available on Council's website. Due to impact of COVID, timetables were altered as people movement reduced affecting demand, however over the 201-2022 year, a total of 153,00 passengers used the service,

Council's Rangers and Parking Officers consistently monitor local streets and parking areas to ensure high levels of regulation compliance to keep Strathfield's streets safe. Complaints about illegal parking were investigated and actioned. High volume traffic areas such as town centres, schools and RPS areas are patrolled regularly as are the Residential Parking Schemes (RPS) that operate in areas of high parking demands to allow residents access to on-street parking near their homes.

Transformed and Connected Information and Services

A key goal of the Community Strategic Plan is to connect and engage with information and services across multiple platforms.

Council provides a website with up to information on Council services, events and programs. In 2020-2021, the Council website attracted a total of 693,525 visitors. There was a general increase in social media activity. Council posted a total of 542 social media posts. Council promoted a number of initiatives including World Mental Health Day, Get Prepared App, Women's Health Week, Road Safety as well as notifications of events, consultations, plans and programs.

Council utilised a wide range of digital and print communication methods to inform the community on issues, events, programs, exhibitions, major projects and initiatives. Council's digital newspaper, E-News, was published on a weekly basis. A total of 62 issues were published in 2020-2021 including weekly and on-off special editions. E-News includes information on major projects, events, proposed plans and works, community news and historical features. Four printed quarterly newsletters were issued on request.

As a result of COVID-19, efficient online services to deliver information, participate in meetings and deliver services such as online programs was critical to continuing Council's operations. Council meetings moved to an online delivery that was live broadcasted enabling all members of the public to watch Council proceedings from their homes or remote locations. Council provided a range of online services such as Council facilities booking system, on-call waste service bookings, library catalogues, Connector Bus online tracking and Community Directories.

Highlights 2020-2021

Healthy and Active Communities

Council provides a wide range of community and recreational facilities to enable all members of our community, irrespective of age, to boost both their physical and mental wellbeing. Council provides sportsfields, playgrounds, courts, outdoor gyms and walking tracks for formal sport and informal recreation and supports a range of recreational and leisure programs.

COVID-19 measures have restricted access to facilities at different times during the last year, which affected formal sports competitions and informal recreation activities. However, Council ensure that access to open space and parks was provided to enable access to exercise and open space. Where access was affected, Council moved community programs to online delivery and as restrictions eased, Council reintroduced programs and worked with clubs and organisations to return to using sportsfields with new COVID-19 procedures to maintain high levels of safety.

Council managed formal use of sportsgrounds, parks and facilities and manage licencing, leases and casual and regular hire arrangements Council renegotiated fees with clubs and schools booking facilities and provided discounts where necessary to assist hirers.

Socially Cohesive and Connected Communities

Council provided support and coordinated community giving campaigns for Share the Dignity and local charitable programs such as St Paul's Anglican Homeless Pantry and St Merkorious Charity which provide food and support in the local area for people in need. The Winter Food Appeal was held in July to August 2020 with donations of non-perishable goods.

Due to COVID measures, many of Council's volunteer programs did not operate during 2020-2021.

Council's community grants program operated annually providing support to local community organisations providing financial assistance for local programs and initiatives. A total of \$46,000 was allocated to community grants.

The Discover Your Council book was created for new settlers in the area to give them more information about Council's role in the community. Council also launched the new Community Directory on the Council website to provide easier access for the community to find local services.

The Strathfield Council area has significant cultural diversity with 56% of residents born overseas and 64% speaking a language other than English at home. Recent community surveys indicate that the Strathfield community have high levels of acceptance of community diversity and support for a multicultural, integrated and cohesive community. Council provided assistance to support the learning and improvement of resident's English skills, through programs such as Conversation Club working with Metro Assist. Programs were offered including Business Administration Certificate training for newly arrived immigrant women.

Council celebrated the Seniors Festival with a free concert on 15 April 2021 in the Strathfield Town Hall. Classes such as Zumba and Yoga were held at the Strathfield Community Centre.

Council's Youth Engagement Advisory Committee, now known as the Strathfield Collaborative Youth Group oversighted Youth Week events such as the Youth Week 2020 Film Fiesta. The involvement of local youth were integral in organising and running White Ribbon and then International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women events and initiatives. The ROAR exhibition of Art from Year 9 and 10 students was scheduled for June 2021 but delayed due to COVID

Youth Drop-In commenced in April 2021 at the Strathfield Library & Innovation Hub for games, music and social activities.

Safe and Accessible Places

Council's Community Safety Strategy 2020-2024 identifies the key areas of offences in the Strathfield Council area and actions to address these key areas. These include Fraud, Steal from Person and Malicious Damage to Property. In collaboration with the local Police command, Council undertook a number of projects and consultations including safety audits at Albert Road, Beresford Road, Cooke Park, Station Street and Homebush Station entrance (north side) in 2020-2021 which identified actions to improve safety by design. Council staff regularly attended Community Safety Precinct Committee (CSPC) meetings to discuss local community safety issues.

A new flag system was established in partnership with Department of Communities of Justice and Wesley Mission to count and monitor rough sleepers.

Council maintained CCTV surveillance program in town centres, major parks and hotspots to support community safety. CCTV footage was also utilised in assisting Police in investigating incidents.

Council provides a range of programs monitor and take action on matters that affect the health and safety of the local community including day/night ranger and parking patrols, swimming pool inspections, monitoring of pollution and animal controls, removal of abandoned vehicles and graffiti vandalism improve the safety in the Strathfield Council area.

Highlights 2020-2021

Engaging and activated public places

Strathfield's Town Centres provide shopping, services and transport as well as places for the community to meet and connect. In the past few years, Council has been upgrading its town centres to improve streetscapes, traffic flows and parking. In 2020-2021, the Homebush shopping centre was upgraded with improvements to the pavements on Rochester Street and Burlington Road. Planter beds, bins and benches were installed. Changes to traffic flow and parking were made including conversion of Burlington Road to increase parking spots and traffic flow. Roundabouts were installed at intersections at Rochester Street/Burlington Road and Rochester Street/The Crescent. Plans for upgrading the Strathfield South Town Centre were consulted in August and September 2020.

The appearance and cleanliness of Strathfield's town centres is important to the community and Council is committed to maintaining town centres to a high level of cleanliness with daily cleaning and waste removal. In addition, Council undertook intensive steam cleaning of footpaths and paved areas twice a year. Council conducted regular inspections of drainage and clearing of pits after heavy rainfalls and storms, and identified hot spots for reporting and repairing of major blockages.

All streets in the Strathfield LGA are regularly swept by street cleaners to improve cleanliness and to improve the quality of waterways by managing stormwater pollution from street gutters. In 2019-2020,

Strathfield's street sweeping service cleaned on a three week cycle or more frequently as required eg seasonal leaf drop periods, heavy leaf litter and emergency operations. A total of 502 tonnes off leaves and other litter from street gutters, main roads, traffic islands town centres etc. collected in 2020-2021.

Since the launch of the Return and Earn at Strathfield Town Centre, over 18 million containers made from glass, plastic, aluminium, steel and liquid cardboard (cartons) have been collected, which reduces containers from general litter. During 2020-2021, over 5 million containers were collected by Return and Earn.

Council implemented its food safety program successfully in 2021-2022, which included inspections of a total of 187 food shops, 10 childcare centres, 11 school canteens and 4 mobile food vans inspected. 80% of all business achieved a rating of three stars (out of five) which met the Council target and resulted in awarding of 'Scores on Doors' certificates to business that achieved this result at the end of routine inspections.

Council carefully monitored businesses which failed to meet standards and investigated 19 food related complaints. A total of 33 improvement notices, 8 warning letters, 6 penalty infringement notices, 2 prohibition orders and 1 prosecution were prepared.

Targeted education was undertaken onsite at premises that were subject to fines or improvement notices. Council's inspectors assessed local businesses COVID-19 Safe Plans and their compliance with the Plan. Premises that do not have a plan, or the plan is deficient were given a warning and the Plan was reassessed shortly after. Premises with insufficient plans at re-inspection were forwarded to NSW Police for further action.

Council provides businesses the opportunity to utilise footpaths for trading and alfresco dining. Over 2020-2021, there were 31 businesses in the LGA providing alfresco dining and 11 footpath approvals. To assist businesses affected by COVID, Council negotiated reductions in fees.

Creative and Cultural Community

The upgraded and refurbished Strathfield Library and Innovation Hub opened in July 2020. The upgrade delivered comfortable and engaging spaces to enhance learning and information sharing. The facility now includes an exhibition square, multi-purpose space, children's area, internal study stadium, computer lab and open meeting quarters. A grant was received from the State Library to purchase technology equipment including laptops, Mac computers and software and a 3-D printer. An 80Kw solar panel system was installed at the Strathfield Library and Innovation Hub in May 2021.

Visitation rates to the Library declined in comparison to previous years due to implementation of COVID-19 measures which required periods of closure or reductions of opening hours. This also affected loans and Wi-Fi or computer sessions at the library. Despite these restrictions, the library continued to provide services including loans of library materials via the library locker system as well as provision of online services. An additional library locker was added in December 2020 at Homebush.

The library service provided community programs such as Storytime, Bub's Club, Book Club and volunteer JP services When in-person services were cancelled due to COVID, where possible online programs such as Singalong were provided.

The new Ironbark Gallery hosted a number of exhibitions which included Erika Cholich – Gilded Perceptions (Oct-Dec 2020), Beyond Sight: Lea Kannar-Lichtenbeger (Feb-April 2021) and Strathfield Answers the Call 1914-1918 WWI exhibition (April-June 2021), an exhibition presented by Strathfield Council and the Strathfield-Homebush District Historical Society. 'ROAR' an exhibition of art from local Year 9 and 10 students was scheduled for June 2021, but cancelled due to lockdown. A video of the exhibition was available on Council's website and shown later in 2021.

Building Community and Social Cohesion

Strathfield LGA is a place of high levels of migrant settlement, however in response to COVID impacts, ceremonies were held on a frequent basis utilising online and in-person sessions. Council held fourteen small citizenship ceremonies from July 2020 to June 2021 and welcomed 340 new citizens into our community. The grantees came from many different countries reflecting the diversity of our community.

Community Events and Celebrations

Council's events programs are designed to support and provide opportunities for involvement by all age groups and interests reflecting the diversity of the Strathfield community. Many of Council's regular events were disrupted or cancelled due to COVID-19 restrictions such as the Strathfield Spring Fair and Cooks River Fun Run. However, International Women's Day Morning Tea (March 2021), Homebush Village Mini Fair (May 2021) and Lunar New Year (February 2021) proceeded.

Christmas in Strathfield was celebrated by Festive decoration in town centres over the Christmas/New Year period. Due to COVID measures, Council organised and filmed a Virtual Christmas Carol celebration featuring a number of performers, which was available on Strathfield TV on YouTube. Christmas Trees were installed in the Strathfield, Homebush West and Homebush Town Centres and the Council Chambers on Redmyre Roads. High visibility streets were also adorned with lights and decorations.

With participation of the Cumberland RSL Sub-Branch, Council held ANZAC Day Memorial Services at Davey Square on April 25 2021 and Remembrance Day Services on 11 November 2020.

In October 2021, Council planted a cedar tree at Strathfield Park this morning in memory of the lives lost during the Beirut explosion in August. A Condolence Book containing messages of sympathy, faith and hope from the Strathfield community was also presented by the Mayor to Mr Charbel Macaron, Consul General of Lebanon in Sydney.

Highlights 2020-2021

Quality, Liveable and Sustainable Urban Design and Development

The quality, liveability and sustainability of the built and natural environment is a key priority for the Strathfield community. The local community want to retain the character and amenities of the Strathfield Council area for the people who live, visit and work here, while accommodating changes to the local area as local population increase and development continues.

The Strathfield Local Government Area (LGA) is part of the Greater Sydney region and its Eastern City District. The region is set to grow over the next twenty years which includes the Strathfield LGA. Council adopted its new Local Strategic Planning Statement (LSPS) in 2020. The LSPS is a 20 year land use planning strategy, based on four interconnected themes of Infrastructure and Collaboration, Liveability, Productivity and Sustainability, which includes a vision, planning priorities and actions. The LSPS sets out Council's long term vision for land use and infrastructure provision and identifies the economic, social and environmental opportunities to deliver and influence a future aligned with our local community's

aspirations and informed by the Community Strategic Plan 'Strathfield 2030'. The LSPS sets out 115 actions with 53 allocated to an immediate timeframe. Of these 28% have been either completed or commenced. The remainder are scheduled for the 2021-2022 year. Of these completed or commenced:

- 18% contribute towards infrastructure and collaboration
- 39% contribute to Strathfield's liveability
- 25% contribute to the productivity of the LGA
- 24% work towards achieving Sustainability outcomes.

Progress was made on the preparation of the Strathfield Local Environmental Plan (LEP) 2021. A number of studies were initiated which together with extensive community consultation provided direction for the new LEP. The Community Participation Plan was amended in October 2020.

As a Sydney metropolitan area, Council is required to address NSW Government regional plans, population and housing future population targets in its land use planning. In 2020, Council prepared a Local Strategic Planning Statement (LSPS) to set out strategies and actions for land use planning for the next 20 years to address community aspirations. Of the actions set out in the LSPS, 28% has been completed or commenced. A new Local Environmental Plan was prepared in 2021 guided by the LSPS and supported by a range of land-use, economic and social studies.

From July 2020, all planning applications required electronic lodgement via the NSW Government Planning Portal. The Local Planning Panel is comprised of a chairman, independent expert member and a community representative and met on a regular basis to consider planning and development matters..

Most of the development assessed and approved was residential development, this included alterations and additions, ancillary development, new dwelling houses, multi-dwellings and some residential flat buildings (RFBs). There has been steady increase of the number of applications being received and assessed. There was a reduction in the amount of Commercial/Retail/Office applications in the 2020 to 2021 period.

In the 2020-2021 period, 269 Development Applications were received with an estimated value of over \$358M. A large mixed use development at 11-12 Columbia Lane added to the high estimated cost value for the 2020-2021 period, being valued at over \$132 million. During the 2017 to 2021 another significant portion of development applications were included under the heading 'other'. These applications include tree removals, ancillary development and other items that cannot be categorised as Commercial, Industrial or Residential.

Clean, Attractive and Well Maintained Neighbourhoods

Between 1 July 2020 and 30 June 2021, Strathfield's Return and Earn Reverse Vending Machines collected a total of 5,249,778 recyclable containers/packages. Total collection since the beginning of the program added up to 18 million items.

Council provided weekly garbage, fortnightly recycling and green waste collection to residential households in the Strathfield Council area. There was an annual collection of an estimated 623,012 domestic waste bins (up from 473,564 in 2020), 311,506 recycling bins (203,580 in 2020), and 175,318 green waste bins (104,364 in 2020).

Council also provides a waste and recycling service to multi-unit dwellings. In 2020-2021 Council collected 5,493.83 tonnes of general waste and 842.4 tonnes of recycling waste from MUDs.

A total of 10,206 tonnes of domestic waste was collected from Strathfield LGA households in 2020-2021, this was an increase from 9,899.68 tonnes in 2019-2020 and 9.631.3 in 2018-2019.

Green waste collections totalled 2,451.26 tonnes which was an increase from the 2319.56 tonnes collected in 2019-2020. A total of 2,163.7 tonnes was collected in recycled waste compared to 2176.74 tonnes in 2018-2019 and 2283.56 tonnes in 2019-2020.

Residents are able to pre-book 3 free Council clean up collections (2m3 each) from https://cleanup.strathfield.nsw.gov.au. In 2020-2021, there were 7,556 bookings for the Council clean-up collection service. A total of 1,199.38 tonnes collected. This was higher than the prior year 2019-2020 of 7120 collections and 1,082.68 tonnes of waste.

A total of 36% was waste diverted from landfill. This is a slight decrease from the 37% diversion rate in 2019-2020.

Council identified recurring waste issues relating to multi-unit dwellings (MUDs) which included contaminated and overflowing waste bins and illegal dumping. A database was developed with updated information on strata managers, building managers and cleaners at those addresses. Waste guidelines were issued to all strata managers with access to multi-language waste education signs. Strata managers were advised that properties would get three formal warnings, prior to issue of an Infringement Notice. Following issue of formal warnings, MUDs compliance with Council's waste guidelines improved.

Council implemented a specific program to reduce litter on Homebush West Industrial Area, supported by a NSW EPA Council Litter Prevention Grant. Council achieved a 92% litter item reduction and 99% litter volume reduction in Industrial Area. There was a 69% litter item reduction and 97% litter volume reduction in residential areas around Sydney Markets.

Using an integrated approach, Council established a clear baseline and goals, identified key stakeholders and determined actions improving education, awareness, infrastructure and enforcement. Partnership with Sydney Markets and six other businesses guaranteed ownership and area maintenance. The ICO program provided litter collection from people doing community service. State Agencies were engaged to maintain fences and nature strips on their land. Several Strata Management companies (comprising 434 units) were engaged to inform and educate residents. "Don't Be a Tosser!" campaign resources were used and adapted, enhancing awareness about litter issue and advertising on desired behaviour.

Council explored other ways to collect waste in order to divert from landfill disposal. Council installed recycling hubs for clothes, e-waste, light globes, batteries, printer cartridges, CDs/DVDs, mobile phones and x-rays at Bates St Community Centre and High Street Community Centre. A total of 2.77 tonnes of waste was collected from recycling stations.

An event called 'Strathfield Recycling Day' was held in April 2021, instead of the usual annual e-waste event. Stakeholders like charities and recycling contractors were engaged to provide solutions to reuse and recycle furniture, e-waste, clothes, bikes, toys, white goods, mattresses and others. There was a significant increase of attendance to Recycling Day (357 vehicles instead of 110 vehicles) and waste collected 15.3 tonnes up from the 8.2 tonnes from previous e-waste event.

Council also promoted other events to increase recycling such as Chemical Clean Out Event in November 2020, together with NSW EPA, in November 2020 as well as ongoing, unlimited free household items collection by The Bower Reuse and Recycling Centre to all residents. Clean up Australia was held on 7 March 2021.

Thriving and Resilient Environment

Urbanisation and land clearing have significantly reduced Strathfield's indigenous vegetation resulting in fragmentation of local habitats and reduction of the viability of habitat to support populations of native fauna (animals and birds). Bush regeneration in Strathfield's parks and public reserves have created a range of habitats for a mix of indigenous and introduced bird species, some mammals, small reptiles, frogs and fish. These habitats are dispersed across five broad types of urban greenspace – bushland remnants, revegetated parkland, open parkland, urban neighbourhood, and wetland and programs, including volunteers, have been developed to support improvements to Strathfield's natural environment.

Green tree canopies are crucial in providing vital shade that reduces ambient temperatures and mitigates the urban heat island effect. They extend habitat, increase biodiversity and improve air quality by removing fine particles from the air and trees mitigate the impact of climate change, acting as a storehouse for carbon dioxide.

Approximately 9% of the Strathfield LGA is open space, which is utilised for parks, reserves and for the conservation of environmentally sensitive areas such as Mason Park wetlands and Coxs Creek Reserve. The estimated tree canopy of the Strathfield LGA is 17% (NSW Planning, Industry and Environment 2019). However, there is considerable variation within the LGA of tree canopy coverage ranging from higher coverage in parks and reserves such as Coxs Creek Reserve (67%) and Ford Park (57%) to very low coverage of under 10% in the industrial areas of Strathfield South, Greenacre and Homebush. The tree canopy includes remnant trees and vegetation as well as exotic ornamentals and the native rain forest trees on public and private property.

It is estimated that there are over 12,500 street trees and 40,000 trees in parks of varying species and ages in the Strathfield LGA. To improve Strathfield's tree canopies, over 2,000 new trees have been planted in areas such as Powells Creek, Hudson Park and along the Cooks River

To improve street tree coverage in Strathfield, a program involving planting of 443 new trees throughout the Council area was implemented in 2020-2021. The transformation of Hudson Park from a golf course into a park also provided an opportunity to increase tree coverage by an estimated 1400 new trees. Many local native plant species of trees and vegetation were used for plantings in parks, roadways, natural areas and gardens.

Council launched the project 'Breathing Green Life Into Industrial Areas' in Bellfrog Street, Greenacre. The project involved a partnership between Council and Macquarie University to road test 15 species of trees, not commonly used in a street environment, to determine which will perform well in the projected heat and environmental conditions of the future. The project is an Australia first and is funded by the Greening Our City grant program.

Strathfield Council partnered with the City of Canterbury-Bankstown in development of the Metropolitan Greenspace Project.

Pollution Reporting

During the 2020-2021 year, Council received and investigated a total of 100 pollution complaints.

Common water pollution complaints related to pollution in the Cooks River, sewer overflows, spills to waterways etc. Air pollution complaints also include complaints about odour and dust which include industrial sites and building sites, as well as some residential complaints regarding smoky chimneys, BBQ use and backyard burning. Noise pollution comes from a residential, industrial and construction premises, of the 55 reported, 13 were from building sites, some relating to working outside of approved hours. Residential complaints commonly are from music and/or parties late at night. Industrial complaints usually relate to noisy machinery and time of use.

Council representatives attended meetings of concerned with monitoring the air quality from ventilation stack tower from the WestConnex motorway at Homebush.

Public Health

Council conducts annual inspections of skin penetration premises that conduct procedures such as waxing, manicure, pedicure, cosmetic tattooing and skin piercing. Equipment such as cuticle cutters, nail clippers, lancets and tattoo needles that penetrate the skin are required to be sterilised in an autoclave before reuse.

All 13 skin penetration premises located in the Council area were inspected in 2020-2021. 30% failed their inspections and actions were taken including issue of 3 improvement and a warning letter.

Council inspects water cooling towers to verify towers have been maintained to a satisfactory standard of construction and cleanliness as control against Legionella. In 2020-2021, there were a total of 16 premises with Cooling Towers and 28 Cooling Tower Systems within the Strathfield Council area. Council inspectors audited records to ensure that routine activities including monthly water sampling, scheduled maintenance and cleaning were documented. 87% were found to be compliant on first inspection and 2 warning letters issued regarding non-compliances.

The Department of Planning, Industry and Environment collects data and reports on air quality concentration in the Greater Sydney Metropolitan area. While Council has a limited sphere of influence over air quality in the local area, Council works with other sectors of government, industry and the community to improve air quality. Air quality in the Strathfield LGA and surrounding areas was very good or good for 92% of the 2020-2021 year, which is a significant increase on previous years. This is mainly attributable to COVID-19 measures which resulted in decline of movement and particularly vehicle use. In the previous year, bushfires over the summer increased the number of hazardous days.

Resource Efficiency and Management

One of Council's goals is to encourage sustainability and resource efficiency, in Council's operations and in the general community. The emissions totals in 2019-2020 shows a general decline in the Strathfield LGA and across most suburbs, likely due to the impact of COVID measures.

Across all facilities of Council, the total energy use for 2020-2021 was 8,367.23 GJ. This represented a decrease from the previous 8,879.36 GJ in 2019-2020. This is partly due to the impact of COVID-19 on Council operations and activities, for example reduced building use and fewer bookings at Council facilities throughout the year. To reduce energy consumption, solar system was installed in Strathfield Library as well as installation of energy efficient lighting in various locations.

The most recent water consumption statistics for the Strathfield LGA are for the 2019-2020 financial year. The major increase occurred in the suburb of Homebush West, while there were reductions in suburbs such as Belfield, Strathfield and Strathfield South. The increase is likely attributable to increases in population and housing growth.


During 2020-2021, use of water in Council facilities including parks and sports fields totalled 24,457kL, which was a reduction of over 10,000kL from the previous year. This result is partly due to impact of COVID restrictions which reduced use of sportsfields, however there has been a general reduction in water use in Council facilities since 2018-2019. This is mainly attributable to reductions of water use in key facilities such as Hudson Park, which was converted from a golf course to a park. Hudson Park Golf Course recorded monthly water usage in June 2018 of 3422kL and in June 2021 recorded 160kL. The June 2021 occurred during a lockdown period, however overall this indicates a significant potable water saving from the park's change of use.

Promoted Inclusion in Decision Making

- Council and Council meetings were held on a regular basis and where required by COVID-19 social distancing mandates, meetings were
 moved online. The Council election was rescheduled from September 2020 to September 2021, but further delayed until 4 December
 2021 due to COVID-19 impacts.
- Councillors were provided with training and ongoing development to assist them in meeting their civic and council roles and responsibilities.
- Councillor briefing workshops were held on a regular basis along with meeting of the Planning Policy Committee.
- A monthly video update of key issues from Council meetings was published on Strathfield TV, a channel on YouTube or via the Council website.
- Community engagement was conducted for major issues and projects
- Council's activities were regularly notified via website and social media. Direct notification via letter was issued to residents and ratepayers on matters of direct impact such as development and planning proposals
- Council's Community Panel, a group of randomly selected local residents, was maintained and membership updated. The Panel provides feedback on specific issues and projects to assist Council in decision making.

A 'Meet your Councillor' session from a mobile office was trialled in March 2021 at Strathfield Square to give the opportunity for the community to meet with a councillor and have their questions answered. Candidate information sessions for the 2021 Council elections were held on 29 May and 17 June 2021.

A new residents information evening was held on 28 April 2021 to welcome new residents to the Strathfield area. The information evening included an informative presentation, opportunities to answer questions and for new locals to meet their Councillors.

Workforce Planning

Council consistently provided the services the community expects in normal times, let alone for the difficult COVID-19 times. The Human Resources function facilitated and supported all of Council's service and functional areas.

Due to COVID, Work Health and Safety had a specific focus in support of decisions and strategies. This resulted in Council workplaces recording no COVID-19 infections, reductions in absenteeism, staff turnover and Workers Compensation Lost Time Injuries and accidents. Council's COVID-19 Management Plan and practice is still a best practice model that allowed Council to function at levels believed to not be seen elsewhere in the industry. Council implemented industry leading initiatives of compressed working hours (4 day/35 hour work week) across the organisation which has resulted in improvements in all HR metrics with no adverse impacts on service quality or quantity for the community.

In overview, during the past year Council:

- Continued to progress in aligning the general community demographics with employment of staff personnel from CALD groups.
- Had its' Work Health and Safety (WHS) practices and processes audited, which were found to be excellent. SafeWork NSW reviewed various elements of our WHS and Workers Compensation function and provided excellent feedback supporting how well Council has undertaken these functions.
- Negotiated with staff and workplace unions to bring about industry leading workplace arrangements (via a Registered Enterprise Agreement) that have resulted in improvements and benefits across all areas of Council.
- Has again engaged in co-operative handling of industrial relations issues between the industrial parties resulting in more engagement of staff to the Council and their roles.
- Is implementing enhanced Performance Management and Learning and Development platforms which will simplify documentation and processes towards continuous improvement, communication, feedback and reward and recognition.
- Reduced the staff voluntary staff turnover rate which improved continuity and consistency of operations and output and reflected improved staff satisfaction and commitment to the organisation.
- Has continued to adapt and respond to the challenges of the COVID-19 environment especially through overt staff support through small acts of recognition and thanks, EAP, flexibility in working arrangements, providing time for vaccination, testing, home schooling, TEAMS meetings and working from home arrangements etc.
- Focused on learning and development via on-line means and distance learning with the full training budget expended throughout the year. All staff had access to training opportunities and the budget was spread across all areas of Council.
- Received no complaints regarding any discrimination or harassment and engaged in respectful and considerate behaviours in all dealings with staff and other contacts.

Customer Services

Council's Customer Services provided multiple touch points for our customers including in-person counter functions, a call centre, and an after-hours 24/7 service. Customers are requested to rate the quality of their customer experience when visiting the Customer Service Centre and 84% rated their experience as highly satisfied.

Council's in-person service counter service was refitted and opening times varied to comply with COVID safe plans to ensure customer and staff safety. Over 2020-2021, Council's Customer Service team managed over 43,000 inquiries. There was a decrease in-person visits likely due to the COVID measures but a significant increase in calls. The grade of service was over 95% answering rate and customer satisfaction rate of 97%.

Risk and Internal Audit

The Audit, Risk and Improvement Committee plays an important role in Council's Governance Framework by providing Council with an independent oversight and monitoring of Council's audit and risk processes. The Committee comprises independent community members, an independent Chairperson and Councillor representation.

Four Audit, Risk and Improvement Committee (ARIC) meetings were held in 2020-2021, which considered the outcomes from the audits conducted. The audits undertaken on key issues including Human Resources - Recruitment and Departures, Payroll (data analytics), Sports Grant T20 2020 Certification Review, Complaint Management, Development Applications. Council's Enterprise Risk Management Framework, Emergency Management Plan, Business Continuity Plan and the Sub-Plan - Pandemic Response and Recovery Plans for the organisation were reviewed and implemented to ensure that Council continued to be vigilant with the COVID-19 situation and requirements under the Public Health Orders.

Council achieved 97% compliance for statutory tasks listed in the Office of Local Government's 'OLG - Calendar of Compliance and Reporting Requirements'.









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
